AWEE's *Paths to Living Free* provides services tailored to ex-felons who want help with successful transition from prison to employment, family, and community. Job readiness workshops; mentoring; help with family relationships; help with job-related expenses (such as tools, uniforms, and exam fees); education referrals; basic supportive services (bus passes, gas cards, food boxes) and much more! AWEE also offers special assistance for ex-felons age 18-29 years through the *Choices for Changed Lives* program. This program offers clients with choices in the types of services received, including some that are of a religious nature. This program starts in late October, and has limited seats available.

These AWEE programs are limited to ex-offenders who have recently been released from prison (less than 6 months ago), and who are non-violent offenders (this encompasses your entire criminal history, not just your current term). These programs serve women and men. The duration of these programs is typically about a year, and you will be required to participate in monthly activities. *This program is 100% supported through funding provided by the U.S. Department of Labor*.

The Learning Center instructors solicit business and industry recommendations to keep their training relevant. Industry representatives provide work experience sites, hire graduates, demonstrate new procedures, offer field trip opportunities and serve on the Advisory Committee.

Programs Offered:

Pre-Employment Work Maturity

The Pre-Employment Work Maturity course prepares participants to enter the world of work. Pre-Employment Work Maturity consists of two parts where the first section, Pre-Employment, addresses job search preparation and the second section, Work Maturity, addresses job retention.

Adult Basic Education

The Adult Basic Education Program at Arizona OIC is an amalgam of individual tutoring, group work and a Comprehensive Competencies Program (CCP) from US Basics. The CCP is a self-paced computer graded course. Workbooks complement the tests from which the students work. The three areas that are covered in Adult Basic Education are Reading, Mathematics, and Language.

Administrative Office Skills

Computerized Office Procedures is intended for students aiming to work in an office using a wide assortment of clerical skills. Participants are inducted in office procedures and how clerical staff support the business practices of a department/firm and its personnel. We prepare students for office positions in a large or small company and in government offices or in schools. Competency, attitudes which promote job retention, and appropriate communication skills are stressed throughout.

The use of the computers is a major part of this program. Students may enroll with or without any prior experience with a typewriter or computer keyboard. Those who can test at an intermediate level may begin with the more advanced activities and complete the program earlier.

It is a comprehensive 24-hour residential and nonresidential programs to prepare youth age 16-24 with basic education through high school, GED, ESL, vocational training for meaningful employment, employability skills, and the responsibilities of citizenship. Services also include counseling, pre-apprenticeship training, participatory recreation and college program.

During the Outreach and Admissions process, prospective trainees learn about the Phoenix Job Corps Center and the opportunities available to them. They are informed about the responsibilities of being a Job Corps trainee and learn about the connection between their Job Corps experience and achievement of their long-term Career goals. To qualify for admission, a prospective student must meet certain eligibility requirements. Based upon an initial assessment of each student's career goals, aptitude, and the availability of vocational offerings, the student is referred to the center by the Admissions Counselors.

Arizona Apprenticeship System

Apprenticeship is a proven strategy that combines on-the-job training with related theoretical and practical classroom instruction to prepare exceptional workers for Arizona's industry. Registered apprenticeship is a training system that produces highly skilled workers that meet the demands of employers competing in a global economy.

Private and public sectors – individual employers, employer associations or joint labor/management sponsors, operate registered apprenticeship programs. Program sponsors pay most of the training costs while also paying progressively increasing wages to apprentices as they gain skills. Registered apprenticeship programs can be competency based or time based depending on program sponsor needs.

Arizona has more than 100 registered apprenticeship programs in such industries as agriculture, forestry, and fishing; mining; construction; manufacturing; transportation, communications, electric, gas, and sanitary services; services; and public administration.

More than 3,100 apprentices are currently registered in apprenticeship programs in Arizona.
